## RRF 09/2016 Hurricane Otto

### II. OPERATIONAL CONTEXT (maximum half page)

Hurricane Otto, category 2 (in the Saffir-Simpson Scale), hit Costa Rica on November 24<sup>th</sup>, leaving 9 people dead, more than 50 000 people have lost houses, livelihoods, and the crops, some of them migrants from Nicaragua and more than 5 500 people evacuated. The heavy rains caused rivers overflow, widespread floods and landslides, destruction of agricultural crops, houses, bridges and basic services facilities like electricity, communication and drinking water.

A total of 11 853 people were evacuated, they were damages reports on rural flooding, overflowing of rivers, streams and creeks, as well as landslides.

Relevant national agencies from the government take care of conducting evacuations in vulnerable areas as well as the rehabilitation of primary and secondary roads. This RRF attended families who don't get help from public institutions, due to the big scale of victims and the focus of government activities in areas where people lost their houses.

### **Food security**

In this area of humanitarian aid, a total of 335 families got benefit, improving the food security of the most vulnerable families affected by the flood, caused by the Hurricane. These households secured the daily food needs of three times a day for a period of four months, allowing them to overcome the most critical months of the year.

**Sanitation & Hygiene Kits**

In this area, a total of 335 families were benefit with the Hygiene Kits, containing: toilet paper, chlorine, wet towels, antiseptic gel, bandages, toothbrushes, toothpaste and alcohol, sanitary towels, soap and shampoo. This aid help the families with this first hand items, and save money to use in other necessities.

## **Forum ACT Alliance Coordination**

Con la ejecución del RRF, el Forum ACT Alliance Costa Rica fue reactivado, luego de más de 2 años de permanecer inactivo. Durante la realización del EDAN, los miembros del Foro en conjunto con socios estratégicos en las zonas afectadas, posibilitó una adecuada identificación de la población con mayor necesidad y que fueron beneficiadas con este RRF.

En cuanto al monitoreo, que se llevó a cabo durante la ejecución de las actividades de entrega de kits, se contó con la presencia de líderes comunales, Policía, Asociaciones de Desarrollo Integral (community government), y socios estratégicos de los miembros del Foro.

El Foro decidió realizar las compras de los insumos para los kits en los mercados locales, con la finalidad de dinamizar la economía local. Lo anterior además bajo condiciones de precios muy competitivos.

### **Visibility of the activities**

Se tomaron fotografías de las entregas de los kits de emergencia en las comunidades beneficiadas. De igual manera, se realizaron varias historias de vida sobre lo que significa la ayuda humanitaria para las personas beneficiarias.

La ILCO como miembro pleno del foro, realizará una publicación en su página web sobre el trabajo realizado en el RRF con las comunidades seleccionadas.

## **V. LESSONS LEARNED**

Las acciones coordinadas por el Foro potenció su reactivación, luego de un periodo de letargo. Los miembros del Foro y las organizaciones auspiciadas actuaron conjuntamente ante los efectos del Huracán Otto, lo que potenció las capacidades de coordinación con actores de cada comunidad para dar respuesta a las familias ante afectadas

La compra de los kits se realizó negociando con los comercios locales, logrando obtener precios más bajos y de esa manera beneficiar a más familias.

La implementación del RRF también posibilitó que se iniciaran capacitaciones iniciales en el tema de mejoramiento de respuesta a emergencias, así como también la necesidad de la realización de un plan operativo anual para el trabajo futuro del Foro durante 2017.

La realización del presupuesto fue efectiva, en el entendido de que los fondos fueron ejecutados de manera eficiente, incluso posibilitando la realización de tres reuniones del Foro ACT Alliance con presencia de personal de apoyo de fuera del país.
